

As shiny as ever


Yellows and pinks are

It's easier to just see the world in white and black Why see it in other colors?





The most well known instance of this is camouflage, using colors to conceal themselves in their environments to either hide from danger, or to lull others into a false sense of security.

Venomous or poisonous animals are often brightly colored to warn predators not to eat them, lest they suffered a gruesome fate. This is known as Aposematism.

Bright flowers attract more pollinators, Colorful animals attract more mates, color is everything. This example of using color to express yourself persists throughout the animal kingdom.





